"Yes," said Jen. "We must save our tree!"




The whole family sat at the dining room table and discussed the situation.


Read about the soil in which plants and trees grow.



Soil might look like dirt to you, but it is one of Earth's most important resources. It is important because it has a supply of things that people and animals need. Soil is mostly little pieces of rock, leaves, and parts of trees. Many insects, like ants, live in the soil. Earthworms do, too.

Earthworms make the soil more useful for everybody.
